1. Why do we need help planning? We need your input on programs for the year, your contacts with good speakers, your knowledge of good subjects. We need your support in planning for the Wildscapes Workshop & Native Plant Sale and the Green Home and Garden Workshop. We need your assistance in helping us plan native plant classes, to form a strategy on how to conserve more natural areas, how to help educate others about native plants, etc.

2. Workgroups: There are native plant exhibition gardens at Levy Park and at the Houston Zoo. Mary Edwards coordinates volunteer efforts and Levy Park and Lisa Yelenick coordinates volunteer efforts at the Houston Zoo. There are many other native plant areas that could use more regular maintenance. There are Saums Road prairie remnants in several locations; these remnants need maintenance to keep invasive species out, and seeds should be collected at appropriate times in the year. Houston Audubon's website lists information about 4 pocket prairies created from Saum's remnants:

- **Pocket Prairie #1** is at Houston Audubon's Sims Bayou Urban Nature Center.
- **Pocket Prairie #2** was installed at **Russ Pitman Park (The Nature Discovery Center)** in Bellaire.
- **Pocket Prairie #3** is at South Braeswood and Buffalo Speedway in southwest Houston..
- **Pocket Prairie #4** is at Mandell Park on Richmond Avenue

Other places needed volunteers, both leaders and workers, including Bolivar's Horseshoe Marsh native plantings, Armand Bayou Nature Center, Katy Prairie Conservancy, Brazos Bend State Park and Sheldon Lake prairie restorations, the Coastal Prairie Partnership's Project Blazingstar, prairie restoration in Hermann Park, native habitat restorations at the Houston Arboretum and Nature Center, invasive plant removals at Jesse Jones Park (and many other local parks) and much more!

3. Display Board. We have many great volunteers for the display board. It's a great way to get to events, and a great way to interact with people who are interested in the environment. There are always a lot more events where we should be represented by the Native Plant Society Information Booth. Please sign up for an event this year!

4. Other Volunteer Opps - Thanks for your interest in native plants, be sure to let us know if you'd like more information about any of these volunteer opportunities, or if you have ideas about other things we could/should be doing.

I hope to see you at a meeting or field trip soon!

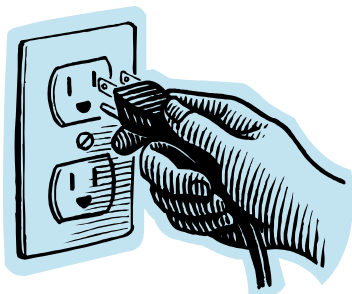

NPSOT-H Fall Field Trips

Three field trips are scheduled for Fall 2010. All three trips will be on Sundays and led by Dr. Larry Brown.

Continue to use the parking lot 0.4 mile east of the Arboretum. (For those new to the field trips, after leaving the Arboretum and heading east, take a right at the split in the road just before the light and then immediately another right into the parking lot. See map below.)

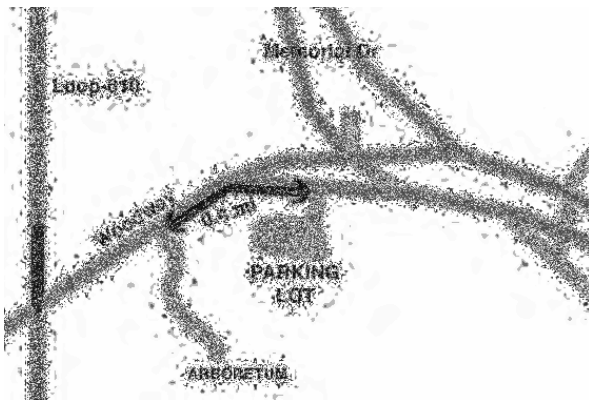
Please wear appropriate footwear for walking through wet or dry fields, bring drinking water and bug spray. If the weather is drizzling rain, we proceed, but if it is a gully-washer, we still gather at the Arboretum and then cancel. We meet at the Arboretum between 8 and 8:30 AM, and depart promptly at 8:30 AM. Please contact Paul Roling for any additional inquiries: 281-353-7413 or PRoling@att.net.

Sunday, October 3: Bear Creek Park on the west side of Houston (approximately 17 miles from the Arboretum) will be our first outing. We were at Bear Creek Park in March of 2008 for the spring flowers. Now we will search the park for the fall flora. The park consists of 2,168 acres of floodplains and forests with trails, a zoo, picnic areas, sports facilities, and more.

Sunday, October 17: Katy Prairie, Tucker Property. On May 8th of this year many of the NPSOT people participated in the spring flower count on the Katy Prairie. We had a great time and documented over 200 species. This time we are going to count the fall flowers at the same property. Can we beat 200 species?

Sunday, October 31: Memorial Park. We looked at the spring flowers earlier this year. Now we will seek out the fall flora. So our third field trip will be in the 1466 acre Memorial Park, where many trails lead to meadows, dense forests, and deep ravines with a large variety of vascular plant species.

Go “greener” by harvesting rainwater to nourish your soil and reduce your water bill. In this hands-on, make & take workshop, learn how a one-time investment of less than \$100 will allow you to harvest 55 gallons of chemical-free water from your roof every time it rains.

Your instructor, Joe Blanton is the Conservation Director at the Houston Arboretum & Nature Center. Joe has an interesting background, with diverse interests and extensive skill sets. From public health to nature education to building trade project management, Joe has studied interpretive environmental science, sustainable land design and wildlife habitat restoration from various national, state and local organizations. Before becoming the Arboretum’s first Conservation Director, Joe designed, implemented and/or managed 16 outdoor environmental classrooms for Urban Harvest and HISD. His latest undertaking has been to become one of the first 100 accredited Green Roof Professionals in North America.

Build Your Own Composting Barrel

Sunday, September 26 2:00 – 5:00 p.m.

According to the Houston-Galveston Area Council, up to 30% of our garbage headed to our rapidly filling landfills is bagged up leaves, grass clippings and tree limbs. Earlier this year, the City of Houston mandated the use of compostable bags to divert your leaves and yard trimming away from costly dumps, saving both city landfill space and tax dollars. Now a private company composts your nutrient-rich wastes and sells it to the public as a natural fertilizer. Learn how to cut out the middle man and compost your own yard and kitchen wastes in this intensive, hands-on workshop where each participant will build their own 55-gallon composting barrel. You can create rich, dark brown compost in as little as 3 weeks! And save money too!

Tree ID for the Novice

Sunday, October 17 2:00 – 5:00 p.m.

Have you ever wondered what that tree is growing in your backyard? Or next door? Or at the Arboretum? In this 3-hour workshop, you will learn how to use leaves and field guides to identify 30 tree species native or naturalized to the Houston area. After the first hour of learning the various parts of a leaf and their positional relationships, you will confirm the identity of 18 labeled specimens in the classroom using two novice-friendly field guides. The third hour will be spent on our trails using your new skills to correctly identify 12 additional non-labeled trees.

Invasive Plants of the Houston Arboretum

Sunday, November 14 2:00 – 5:00 p.m.

As more homeowners become aware of the advantages of a native plant landscape – less water usage, drought tolerant, disease resistance, and better habitat for insect pollinators, migratory birds, and urban wildlife – the questions arise: “Which non-native plants should I remove? Which native plants are suitable substitutes?” Using an array of online and printed resources, join your instructor, Conservation Director Joe Blanton for a introductory tour of the world of invasive plant species. Later, the focus of the walking tour on the Arboretum’s grounds will be on our “Dirty Dozen”, twelve plant species that fulfill the legal definition of an invasive: a species that occurs in an area, region, ecosystem or habitat in which it did not originate and causes negative economic and environmental impact on the landscape and to human health. Come see for yourself how yesteryear’s landscaping choices are negatively affecting today’s health of our local forest ecosystem. And what conservation-minded volunteers are doing to further our mission to protect and enhance the Arboretum as a haven and as a sanctuary for native plants and animals.

Field Trip Report

Thirteen participants braved threatening rain on Saturday, May 15th, to visit the several hundred acre coastal prairie at U of H's Coastal Center in Galveston County. Dr. Larry Brown led the group and identified 50+ wildflowers and grasses, including *Dalea compacta*, var. *compacta* (Compact prairie clover), *Manfreda virginica* (False aloe), *Rudbeckia texana* (Texas coneflower), *Asclepias longifolia* var. *hirtella* (Longleaf milkweed), *A. verticillata* (Whorled milkweed), *Silphium radula* var. *gracile* (Roughstem rosinweed), *Polytaenia nuttallii* (Prairie Parsley), and *Frangula caroliniana* (Carolina buckthorn). Thanks to Katy Emde for encouraging a 4th spring field trip and Paul Roling for organizing all the Houston Chapter field trips.
